The Honors College celebrated 50 years of honors education at UNC Charlotte this year, and we are getting ready for 50 more!

The number of honors programs on campus now totals 29,

a 39% increase since 2011. With 608 honors students and 159 merit scholars currently served by the Honors College, capacity in honors opportunities for high-achieving undergraduates at UNC Charlotte has grown 46% since 2011. And we plan to keep growing! More faculty are teaching honors courses for the Honors College and more students are graduating with departmental honors than ever before. Plans are underway to double the capacity of the University Honors Program, our largest and oldest multi-year honors program, housed in the Honors College. Stay tuned...

Thanks to all of you who support honors opportunities for high-achieving students at the University. 









Study Abroad Stories



The 50th year of honors education at UNC Charlotte also brought with it our first Honors College originated study abroad experience City as Text: The International Version. Fifteen students, representing the University Honors Program, the Business Honors Program, and several departmental honors programs, traveled to Dublin, Edinburgh, and London to conduct research on the cultures of these locations. Students completed portfolios to document their journeys and received credit for an Honors Topic course.

Days before the group's departure, a massive winter storm touched down in the United Kingdom, cancelling numerous international flights. As a result of this adversity, Honors College students took the initiative to schedule their own alternative methods of transportation, demonstrating their ability to perform under pressure, as well as take on leadership roles in moments of crisis. Several students took a very round-about way to get to Dublin — taking trains from London to the Holyhead Station in Wales, catching a ferry into the city. One student even had his flight rerouted through Germany.





When asked about the trip, Luke Lowry had this to say,
This was definitely one of the most memorable experiences of my life.
All three cities were individually unique and full of wonderful history,
culture, and vibrancy. Although the trip had its fair share of mishaps
with bad weather and canceled flights, this forced us to adapt and get
out of our comfort zones. Once we realized that we couldn't control
every detail of our trip, we were much more willing to fully engage
with the culture and lay our preconceived notions to the side.
This shared experience is highly beneficial to students and
promotes the ideas of inclusivity and cultural diversity that the
Honors College strives to uphold by encouraging students to
examine the perspectives of those who see the world differently.



I am a junior in the Arts and Architecture Honors Program, working towards a BFA with a concentration in Fibers. Business Honors Program

This past summer I had the opportunity to serve as a research assistant at Johns Hopkins University's Center of Humanitarian Health as a data management intern on the Child Marriage under Emergency Contexts (CMEC) research team. The CMEC initiative studies the prevalence rates and risks associated with child marriage in internally displaced populations of Ethiopia, Lebanon, and Myanmar through a partnership with Johns Hopkins, the Women's Refugee Commission, and International Medical Corporations in each county. Fortunately, I will be continuing my work as an intern for the Child Marriage under Emergency Contexts (CMEC) team through the rest of this semester and into the new year. My projects for the upcoming months consist mainly of cleaning incoming data from partnering locations, preliminary analyses on key indicators, and finishing writing the manuscript on the child marriage data collected from Ethiopia earlier this year.

In addition to keeping busy with my research endeavors, I also participated in the third annual Service Charlotte that took place on Saturday, October 20th. The event is a unified day of service among UNC Charlotte student organizations and academic departments, where groups come together and volunteer at various nonprofits across the greater Charlotte area. As Director of the event this year, I am thrilled to announce that we quadrupled our participation from the previous years and gave back to nine partners across our community. The longitudinal goal of this event is to increase the measurable outcomes of UNC Charlotte's culture of philanthropy and outreach.

The Business Honors Program has been pivotal in my undergraduate experience, as I've enjoyed learning among an eclectic group of intellectuals, participating in stimulating coursework, and serving the greater Charlotte area through various civic engagement endeavors.

During my first year as an honors student in the University Honors Program, I observed several of my peers take part in amazing research opportunities and realized why UNC Charlotte is North Carolina's urban research university. I was inspired to find something that I was passionate about and explore opportunities for research. In August, I saw an advertisement for an upcoming research summit for Emergency Medical Services – the perfect opportunity to do research of my own.

I was born and raised in Charlotte, North Carolina, and am proud

In September, I attended the Foundation for Pre-hospital Medicine Research EMS Research Summit at the North Carolina Emergency Medical Services Conference. The EMS Research Summit is a two-day event where groups use real data to learn about the research process, formulate a research question, and produce an abstract. My research group studied two topics: pediatric intubation success based on age group, and disparities in pain management in the pediatric population. It was fascinating to see the data come to life to tell a story, especially for a field that I am passionate about.



I have been working for EMS for Cabarrus County since September 2017. When I am on the ambulance, I work with a Paramedic to respond to calls for emergency medical services. In addition to driving the truck, EMTs provide basic life support for patients that are less critical, and assist Paramedics with patients that may be experiencing life–threatening emergencies. Being able to help someone in need and seeing how our work impacts the lives of our patients is the reason I enjoy this type of work.

Currently, I am weighing my options for post–graduate opportunities. My plan is to apply for a paramedic certification program and eventually a masters program in either Business or Healthcare Management.

Alumna Spotlight

Pavani Gingrich, a 2016 graduate and former Ambassador for the University Honors Program, has been making big strides since finishing her undergraduate Biology degree. When asked about her experiences, she had this to say...

What was your Honors experience as a student at UNC Charlotte like?

I was part of the University Honors Program (UHP) during my four years undergrad at UNC Charlotte, and it was definitely a highlight of my undergraduate experience. My very first friends in college were people I met while living in honors housing. From the first weeks, there were so many opportunities to meet my peers and really establish that tight-knit UHP family. I loved how there were so many different ways for students in UHP and the Honors College to connect with each other




at social events and community service events. Another layer about the Honors College and UHP that I loved was the opportunity for leadership. I was part of the inaugural class of UHP Student Ambassadors. My favorite part about being an Ambassador was getting to tell prospective students and their families all of the incredible benefits of being a UHP student at UNC Charlotte. Personally, I gained so many life skills, as well as knowledge, from my honors classes and other honors opportunities, and I wanted other students to have the same opportunity as I did to enhance their college experience through honors.

Where are you now?

I am currently a first year medical student at St. George's University School of Medicine. After graduation, I took a gap year to gain some working experience and take my time applying to medical school without having the stressors of school. I knew even before college that I wanted to go into the medical field, specifically to become a doctor, so when I came to UNC Charlotte, I took the most common route of most pre-medical students and declared Biology as my major. That curriculum was very meticulous, but being a UHP student allowed me to broaden my horizons by taking courses that focused more on critical thinking and analysis. I think some of those classes were especially beneficial to how I looked at complex situations. They changed the lens through which I now analyze situations and obstacles.

What did you do in the interim between graduation and where you are now? I found an internship at Levine Cancer Institute in uptown Charlotte, previously held by an Honors College alumni, as a Patient Education Writer. This was my first real experience with the administrative side of healthcare. When I started, a project had just begun to develop a cohesive website of Patient Education handouts (like the ones you get at the doctor when you are sick) that are specific to the needs of cancer patients and Levine Cancer Institute. This was my first hands-on experience at writing easy to understand healthcare information for the everyday person. It was an eye-opening experience that made me understand the larger scale of healthcare and how it works.

How did your experience as an Honors College member shape you for your future endeavors?

The Honors College, UHP, and all of its requirements as far as social, enrichment, and service events really prepare you for working with people from all backgrounds, cultures, and levels of professional hierarchy. The real world is such a melting pot. I did not feel as lost in my post-grad experiences as I thought I would, and I credit much of my comfort to my honors experience.





Martin Scholars Take on New York City



Faculty Spotlight



Ashli Stokes, Ph.D., is an Associate Professor in Communication Studies as well as the Director of the Center for the Study of the New South at UNC Charlotte. Outside the classroom, Dr. Stokes has been quite involved in a very interesting topic: food! She has turned her interest in food into a many projects, including a book and an Honors College course.

Dr. Stokes studies social movements, activism, and public relations, but over time she developed an increasing interest in food and how to eat healthier. Dr. Stokes became aware of the Slow Food Movement (a world-wide social movement focused on eating clean and healthy), which inspired her first project, analyzing the communication strategies of the Slow Food Movement.

Following this, she questioned if there was a Slow Food Movement around southern food and found that the Southern Foodways Alliance was doing the same as the Slow Food Movement in the South. As her interest in southern food increased, so did her desire to write a book. Dr. Stokes and her co-author, Wendy Atkins-Sayre, were awarded a book contract, so for a year and a half the two explored and analyzed over 100 places such as restaurants and farmer's markets. When their book, *Consuming Identity: The Role of Food in Redefining the South*, was released in 2016, it received a number of positive responses, both in journals and by the Southern Foodways Alliance.

Dr. Stokes wanted to share her passion of food with students and knew that in the Honors College topics are explored beyond what is taught in most classrooms. In her course (HONR 3700 Consuming Southern Foodways), she wants students to learn how to understand persuasion/rhetoric, and how to think more critically about food.

In spring of 2019, Dr. Stokes plans to hold a cooking exercise to see if food will act as a unifier by motivating people of different backgrounds to talk to one another. Dr. Stokes is also working on a paper that addresses "fancy" southern food versus "causal" southern food, which will hopefully lay the groundwork for her next book. We look forward to seeing where Dr. Stokes goes next in her foodways research!

Honors Council

The Honors Council is a standing committee of Honors Faculty that serves as the advisory body to the Executive Director of the Honors College, and reports to the Office of the Provost. The Council also serves to review and evaluate the honors curriculum, program proposals and revisions, and the Executive Director of the Honors College.

Dr. Benjamin is an adjunct faculty member in the Honors College and works with University Honors Program seniors on their capstone portfolio projects. She comes to UNC Charlotte from Grinnell College in Iowa, where she taught African American literature, served as associate dean, and directed the Mellon Mays Undergraduate Fellowship Program. Before joining the Grinnell College faculty, Dr. Benjamin directed the Honors College at Johnson C. Smith University.

Christopher "Chris" Cameron, Ph.D.

Dr. Cameron joined the Honors College in 2018 as the Faculty Fellow overseeing course proposals and faculty development. He is an Associate Professor of History and the Director of the History Honors program. Dr. Cameron also serves as the new At-Large member on the Honors Council, and has supervised numerous honors thesis projects.





Reuben Howden, Ph.D.

Faculty Fellow for Crown Scholar students, Dr. Howden is an Associate Professor in the Department of Kinesiology, where he has been a faculty member since 2008. Each year, APC invites dynamic and engaging keynote speakers to present to all the attendees.
